Entry forms are still available at club nights from me or via the club website - advance entry fee is £12 per person (more details later in this newsletter) or £15 on the day.

I recently needed repair work undertaken on the driver's seat for my 1952 YB Saloon and John Copleston at Phoenix Classics recommended upholstery specialist Katie Martin (pictured) who runs her own business called Totally Trimmed.

I dropped the seat off with Katie at her workshop at Throop and she was able to have a broken internal support welded and then re-instated the seat fabric and springs so that the seat is now as good as new.

Katie and her husband specialise in restoring and renovating VW Kamper vans (their yard is packed with all ages and all conditions of Kamper vans) which is their first love, but she also undertakes making and repairing seats for classic cars (she has a strong following among local Triumph owners) with a long order book - so she must be doing something right.

I can recommend her work - although be prepared to wait as she is a busy lady and takes time off to go touring in Europe.



MG HEADING FOR GOODWOOD

MG is powering up for the 2025 Goodwood Festival of Speed by confirming that two design showpieces, the Cyberster Black and Cyber X, will make their European debuts during the event which runs from 10 to 13 July They will also unveil two new technologically advanced EVs at Goodwood with the first opportunity to see them being at 11 am on Thursday, 10 July.

The Cyberster Black features a deep black paint treatment with contrasting chrome accents and an all-black interior. While the Cyber X concept showcases the potential of the 'Cyber' subbrand featuring a head-turning and youthful EV 'urban explorer' complete with eye-catching pop-up headlamps and extremely short front and rear overhangs.

Also in the MG line-up will be the barn-storming MG EX4 EV with a striking new livery especially created for the event and which pays homage to the MG Metro 6R4 plus the new MGS5 EV and award-winning MG HS SUV.

There is now only just a few weeks left to get your entry in for our Annual Garden Party and Picnic on Sunday 10 August at Athelhampton House and Gardens.

Advance booking fee is £12 per person - entry forms are available at club nights from Chris Adamson or via email at chris@1020mg.org.uk or one can be downloaded from the diary section of the 1020 website - see 10 August entry on the Home page.

Pre-booking provides direct entry to the event, access to the gardens, reserved parking on the rear lawn, access to the licensed restaurant café, a free event programme, discounted admission to the Elizabethan House and for the first 70 cars to arrive on the day a free goodie bag.

The day features regional MGOC club displays, trade stands, summer hamper draw, tombola, a rolling wine raffle, jigsaw sales, a silent auction and new for 2025, a cake stall. This year we have guests attending from Dorset Triumph TR Register and the Dorset Jaguar Enthusiasts Club.

All proceeds from the day are going to our nominated charities: Dorset & Somerset Air Ambulance and Macmillan Caring Locally. Gates open at 10am (volunteers can arrive from 8am). Competition presentations take place at 2pm and the day finishes around 4pm. Setting-up of the relevant event shelters, parking signs and club banners will take place on the day before at 3pm - volunteers to assist will be required.

Advance entries close on Friday 01 August. On-the-day admission for those not pre-booked will be £15 per person but this does not guarantee reserved parking on the lawn.





ATHELHAMPTON DAY - HOW YOU CAN SUPPORT YOUR CLUB

Saturday Set-up:

We need volunteers to come along to Athelhampton the day before our event to help erect the various stand gazebos, club signs and mark out the parking areas for the various visiting clubs.

If you can spare some time please get there for 3pm - the more helpers the quicker things will get done.

Volunteers on the day:

Club members will be needed to staff the various stalls, welcome cars as they arrive and marshal the parking on the rear lawn. Volunteers for the morning duties are asked to be there as soon after 8am as possible.

It is hoped that every club member attending the day will do their bit to help spread the workload. You will also need to supply a list of ingredients for each cake so that those who have dietary requirements can check they are not allergic to any ingredient.

The life story of a bee hive

Club member Sue Hanstead passed on some of her knowledge from 13 years of bee keeping, the importance of bees for the health of our planet, the lifecycle of a bee hive, the tasks of individual bees and all things honey at last month's club night.

Illustrated with images and props (such as her bee suit and smoker - see right) her talk produced some interesting and amazing facts such as the Queen bee lays up to 2,000 eggs a day; worker bees (the ones you see in your garden) are females from unfertilised eggs; Queen bees live for three to four years; drone bees are all male and die after mating with the queen (their only task in life) and have a life span of just three weeks, and around 60.000 bees live in one hive.

Sue went on to explain the role of individual bees such as the workers who clean the hive, nurse the brood, clean other bees, build the honeycomb (a wax produced in their mouth), storing nectar and repairing the hive.

There are even specific guard bees who protect the hive and others who collect water to cool the hive and dilute the honey.

For those bees collecting the nectar and pollen, they can travel up to a mile from the hive, visit between 50 and 100 flowers each trip and make up to ten trips out per day.



Incredibly, it takes the product of the whole life of 12 bees to make a single teaspoon of honey which we consume. And to illustrate this Sue brought long samples of honey and their honeycomb for everyone to try - some people definitely got into a sticky mess.

Jackie goes for an MGB ride



Following his talk on being a driving instructor to a recent club night, guest speaker Clive St James Greenaway donated his fee to the club charities but in return asked if someone would take his wife Jackie out for a passenger ride in an MGB as she used to own one many years ago.

Club member Paul Proudlock kindly arranged for Jackie to have a trip out in his MGB Roadster and fortunately they enjoyed good weather - Jackie reports she was delighted with the journey and it brought back many happy memories.

Thruxton Retro

Club members Janet and Paul Palmer organised the Wessex Vehicle Preservation Club's display at the recent Thruxton Retro historic race meeting staged at the Hampshire circuit.

Best selling MG gets hybrid power

MG has added its latest Hybrid technology to its best-selling sports utility HS range.



The powertrain consists of a dedicated 1.5T Hybrid petrol engine (105kW), working in conjunction with an electric motor (146kw) powered by an on-board generator and large capacity 1.8kWh battery.

Combined power is 225ps which allows the MG HS Hybrid+ to accelerate from 0-62mph in 7.9 seconds, through a two-speed auto transmission first seen on the MG HS Plug-in Hybrid. Despite the strong levels of power, the MG HS Hybrid+ is still able to achieve 51.3 MPG (WLTP combined) in addition to CO2 emissions of 126g/km.

The MG HS Hybrid+ SE is available from £28,995 OTR and the MG Hybrid+ Trophy for £31,495 and both models are supported by a comprehensive 7-year/80,000 miles MG warranty.





Formula One 75th Anniversary Exhibition opens at National Motor Museum

A new exhibition to mark 75 years since the inaugural Formula 1 World Drivers' Championship in 1950 has opened to the public at the National Motor Museum at Beaulieu.

The display brings together nine iconic Formula 1 racing cars, including cars from World Championship winning teams such as BRM, Lotus, Williams and Ferrari. Each vehicle represents a decade of technical and sporting development in Formula 1's illustrious history - as well as some of its most legendary drivers. Arranged in chronological order, the featured cars are: the museum's own BRM V16 which was driven by Juan Manuel Fangio and Stirling Moss at the 1951 British Grand Prix; a Lotus 49 from 1967 (the first car to use the legendary Ford-Cosworth DFV engine); the March 761 as driven by Vittorio Brambilla, Lella Lombardi and Ronnie Peterson; the Williams FW11 (from 1986) Red 5 as driven by Nigel Mansell; the Adrian Newey designed Williams FW15C driven by Alain Prost and Damon Hill; the Ferrari F2002 that took Michael Schumacher to 10 Grand Prix victories; the Jaguar R5 which was driven in the 2004 season by Mark Webber and Christian Klen; the Red Bull RB9 from 2013 driven by Sebastian Vettel (to 13 race wins on his way to his fourth title); and the Williams FW43B which took George Russell to second place in the Belgian Grand Prix of 2021.



In addition to seeing the fearsome race cars, visitors can try their hand at being a Formula One racing driver on an F1 simulator experience pitting their skills against the famous Silverstone Circuit. The simulator session lasts 15 minutes and costs £15 (use is subject to height and weight restrictions) - there will be a monthly prize of a Scalextric set for the best lap time. The temporary exhibition runs until Sunday 02 November.

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
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
