But, of course, the great British weather intervened and when we arrived no one had jumped due to the low cloud and many had been there since 7.30am. Fortunately after a little persuading those already in our reserved seats relinquished them for our lunch.

I think the staff did a magnificent job in getting the food served as quickly as they did bearing in mind they were working in a tiny temporary kitchen as the result of their original café being destroyed by arsonists (reportedly two 12 year olds) who set the adjacent listed hangar alight several months ago.

Hopefully the delay didn't spoil anyone's enjoyment of the day and at least the weather was suitable for classic motoring.

## **News from the AGM**

Eddie Milligan was named as the Club Member of the Year at last month's Annual General Meeting - this was in recognition of his regular efforts at numerous club events during the year including manning the jigsaw sales at Athelhampton and always being the first to volunteer to erect and dismantle the club event shelter at various shows.

Unfortunately, Eddie and his wife Sybil were unable to be at the meeting as they were preparing to depart on a holiday to India - it is hoped to be able to present the award, the Charlton Shield, to him at this month's meeting.

There was also good news at the AGM for Keith Halstead (a regular on club runs and shows with his MGTD) when his name was drawn out of the hat in the Membership Draw which gave him a £50 cash prize.

The formal part of the meeting included the confirmation of the annual accounts which showed a surplus on the year of £675 and an overall bank balance of just over £11,000. Club member Dave Brooks asked if the club really needed to hold such a large amount in its account and suggested it could be used to benefit the club charities.

Chairman Chris Adamson said that the committee would review its finances and the disposal of any surplus funds in the coming months, but he was keen that they club retained a healthy balance in case the main 2026 annual fund-raising event didn't go as well as it has in recent years. There may also be the need to replace some club equipment.

Treasurer Ursula Bonner proposed increasing the annual membership fee to £15 for a couple/family and £10 for an individual. She said that this would be the first increase in the fee since 2011 and Chris Adamson pointed out that the room hire for the monthly meetings had recently been increased by 50 per cent. The proposal was agreed by the meeting.



The meeting also approved the nomination of the two club charities for 2026 - Macmillan Caring Locally and Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance. This year's cheque presentations are featured elsewhere in this newsletter.

Apart from the loss of the late Colin Sexton, the committee was re-elected on block for the coming year. Chris Adamson said that he was still looking for additional members to join the committee and would be seeking help on specific occasions from individual members.

The meeting concluded with an illustrated talk on 'A Brief History of Odd Flying Machines' by club member Ian Lane (see more elsewhere in this newsletter), the usual monthly club raffle and cakes (see the selection above) as the AGM is always the club's birthday meeting.

# **Charity Cheque Presentations 2025**

Last month's meeting included the presentation of cheques to the club's two nominated charities - Macmillan Caring Locally and Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance - this year, the committee agreed to give each charity £2,000.

The money being presented was mainly raised at the club's annual day at Athelhampton House and was supplemented by income from various other club activities and a sale of goods.

Collecting the cheque on behalf of Macmillan Caring Locally was Clare Kyrillou, their Community and Events Fundraiser, who said: "Thanks to everyone's efforts and support, more families will be able to make the most of precious moments together, and more patients will be able to achieve their final wish of dying in the loving comfort of their own home.

"Over 200 patients are benefiting from our Hospice at Home service every year. Not only is Hospice at Home receiving huge appreciation from patients and their families, but it is also helping to improve services at Royal Bournemouth Hospital and in our community, where it is reducing the need for hospital admissions, and taking some of the pressure off District Nurses and Paramedics.





"It is really good news when a new service improves so many areas of healthcare. And that's thanks to the members of Bournemouth and Poole MG Owners Club, you have made a truly meaningful difference to our charity, and for that we are extremely grateful."

Following the presentations, Chris Adamson has received a letter from Trust Secretary Neal Williams explaining that part of the money will also be going to the Family Support Team based at Christchurch Hospital.

'Suffering from cancer or a life threatening illness is a stressful and difficult journey. Watching a loved one going through it is emotionally and mentally challenging, which can often be overlooked,' writes Neal.

Representing Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance were volunteers Jill and Martin Andrews who have been to 1020 events in the past (Martin is himself a former MG owner).

Martin explained how the helicopter service operates as a mobile hospital where each mission costs around £3,500, so every amount donated is vital.

He explained that the main fund-raising efforts at the moment are on finding £1 million in the next eight to nine months to purchase a second helicopter which would be able to provide cover when the existing helicopter is either being serviced or repaired. Having their own reserve helicopter would save on the cost of hiring a back-up.

# **D-Day Museum Coach Trip - SOLD OUT**

A surge of interest has resulted in the next 1020 coach trip being fully booked for the visit to the D-Day Museum at Portsmouth on Thursday 13 November 2025.

The trip is being organised by committee member Alasdair Wellwood who has been inundated with requests for seats.

A reminder to all those booked that the coach will be departing Hamworthy Sports Club at 9am and then dropping off anyone who wants to spend the day at Gunwharf Quays only before proceeding to the D-Day Museum at Southsea where participants will have at least four hours to tour the attraction and have lunch.

Return timings will be agreed on the day but the coach should be back at the Hamworthy Club by 5pm at the latest.



## The odd balls of the flying world

Prior to the Autumn Road Run and visit to the Boscombe Down Aviation Collection, club members were given an entertaining and fact-filled introduction to the more bizarre side of aviation history at the October meeting, thanks to fellow club member lan Lane.

To give him his full title, Professor Ian Lane CEng FRAeS (Imperial College Department of Aeronautics), was presenting an illustrated talk entitled 'A Brief History of Odd Flying Machines'.

Having started his career at the British Hovercraft Corporation before moving on to work on military helicopters and then chief engineer at Airbus, Ian more recently worked for the VTOL Company in Bristol and as Professor at Imperial College London and, today, is employed three days a week as an aircraft safety adviser at the Civil Aviation Authority.





His highly informative talk started with the birth of aviation and, of course, the Wright Brothers who were the first to get a powered vehicle off the ground using the basic principals of power from an engine and the shape of a wing overcoming the pull of gravity.

It was this belief that huge amounts of engine power combined with planks (wings) could make anything fly that led to some of the more outlandish creations such as multi-wing aircraft, a flying pancake and even aircraft with wings that flap.

Using a large selection of historical images, Ian explained why some of these creations worked and why others never got off the ground.

## Christmas Lunch - all seats taken

All places at the 1020 Christmas Lunch on Sunday 07 December at the Bridge House Hotel, Longham have been taken, and we even have reserves waiting for any late cancellations.

Apologies to anyone who has missed out on a place at the Christmas Lunch, the tickets sold out within minutes of being available at the October club night.

Ursula Bonner has taken the names of those who were not in the first 65 and they will be given places should anyone drop out ahead of the day - this often happens at this time of the year with lots of colds and flu going around.

Remember that if you have already booked and paid and then find you cannot make the lunch there are only refunds if cancelled before Monday 01 December.

The lunch includes a roast carvery main course with a selection of meats (vegetarian alternative available) and help yourself vegetables, a choice of desserts, tea and coffee and festive crackers.

There will also be a fun Christmas themed quiz (set as in previous years by Adrian Mullins) with a small prize for the winning table.

Wendy Brooks will once again be providing one of her magnificent Christmas Hampers which will be raffled during the meal with a runner's-up prize. All proceeds will be going to the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal.

The Bridge House function room has a maximum capacity of 65 people which cannot be enlarged which sets our limit. In recent years this has been just about ideal but we are aware that there might be more people interested in the future.



As a result, the committee is looking at potential venues for 2026 which could offer a larger capacity.

The benefits of the Bridge House are that they don't charge us a room hire fee which most hotel venues would expect, and the carvery style service is preferred by most members as individuals can load up their plates with their preferred choice of meat and vegetables rather than having it pre-plated.

If you know of a venue that you think might be suitable for next year please let someone on the committee know.

The ideal venue has plenty of free parking, a carvery service (preferred but not essential) and a function room that could cater for up to around 75 people.

And of course, we would prefer not to have the added cost of paying a separate room hire fee.

## Autumn Road Run - cars and planes



Thirty club cars assembled at Sammy's Pit Stop café at Bashley for the start of last month's 1020 Autumn Road Run - many participants taking the opportunity to take advantage of the discount deal on breakfast baps and hot drinks before setting off.

The wide cross-selection of MG models ranged from a 1950s MGTD through the usual horde of MGBs and GTs and on to an MGC and several MGB V8s as well as more modern MGFs and TFs, a ZR and a ZS plus an MG3.

Among those there to see the cars depart, and taking a great interest in all the cars, was multiple world champion Sammy Miller (pictured right chatting to Paul and Angie Proudlock), the founder and driving force behind his own motorcycle museum.

With a relaxed timetable, cars set off on a 40-mile scenic cross-country road route heading due north through the New Forest using lesser-travelled roads passing through Brockenhurst, the Bolderwood Ornamental Drive, Nomansland, East and West Grimstead, Farley, West Dean and Pitton before reaching Old Sarum airfield where there was reserved parking outside one of the historic World War One listed aircraft hangars.

Many of the early arrivals took the opportunity to sample the liquid options at the Dark Revolution micro-brewery and tap room before heading to the pre-ordered lunch at the extremely busy Hangar 3 café.

Here club members joined some 150 skydivers and their guests - the café was unexpectedly busy as the low cloud had prevented any jumping in the morning and lots of divers were waiting for the sun to come out to catch their flights.



Fortunately, tables had been reserved and the café staff worked wonders to get everyone served despite only having access to a temporary microwave, one griddle and one pizza oven - the result of the original café being destroyed in a fire earlier this year.

After lunch the group was free to tour the Boscombe Down Aviation Collection .



Displays include a Harrier jump jet, Hawk T1 (similar to that used by the Red Arrows), Hawker Hunter, Tornado GR1T, Gloster Meteor, Avro 707A, BAC 1-11 and an English Electric P1 Lightning plus several helicopters.

Many clambered up the sides of the displays to sit in the cockpit of several of the aircraft, including a Lancaster Bomber, or try their hand at a flight simulator.


The collection, which is housed in two Royal Flying Corp hangars dating from 1917 also features the Royal Flying Corps collection including uniforms, flying clothing, weapons, photography and medals from the pre-RAF days.

Those who stayed late also had the added bonus of finally seeing the skydivers in action as the clouds cleared and blue skies offered a pleasant drive home.

The next 1020 Road Run in February will also have an aviation theme as it is due to finish with a roast lunch at the Compton Abbas airfield - full details and entry forms will be available in the coming months.

## MGs galore in SWVA Classic Sale

The next classic sale at South Western Vehicle Auctions takes place on Thursday 30 October and includes a wide selection of MGs spanning 40 years of the marque.

Opening lot in the sale is a 'barn find' 1979 MGB (right) that has been off the road for many years (hence an odometer reading of 36,164 miles and the dusty red paintwork) and will need recommissioning to get it running again. It has no supporting documentation and is being sold with no reserve.

Next up (Lot 5) is a 2000-year MGF, finished in Solar Red with a black soft top and a black half leather interior - another entry with no reserve. It comes with a well-documented history file containing old MOTs, invoices and the original MG book pack. Recorded services span from 2000 at 2,842 miles through to 2021 at 75,900 miles.

The car has been fitted with stainless underbody coolant pipes, has a matching set of Toyo Proxes TR1 tyres, a removable boot-mounted luggage rack and a breathable tailored-fit car cover are included in the sale.

Another MGF with no reserve appears as Lot 10 this time an early 1996 example in red which has been with the last owner for over 20 years. It comes with both soft and hard tops.

Four entries later (Lot 14) is yet another no reserve MGF this time finished in Nightfire Red with a contrasting black soft top and beige half-leather interior and 82,880 miles indicated.

This entry is supplied with modified head gaskets, a full cam belt kit with water pump and upgraded stainless steel pipes, while the braking system has been renewed with replacement discs and pads front and rear, plus a pair of callipers.

The youngest MG in the sale (Lot 16) is a 2004 ZT 260 V8 saloon in silver over a black half leather interior with 106,000 miles indicated which again has no reserve so will sell on the day.

Owned by the vendor for the last 18 years, this ZT 260 has two former keepers and comes with a history file, including numerous invoices for servicing and maintenance. Importantly, it also benefits from a recent service carried out in April 2024.

Moving along at Lot 19 in the catalogue we find a 1977 MGB Roadster in white which sits on its original restyle wheels and has a new hood fitted in 2022.

Recent replacements include a new steering rack, a Stage 2 lead-free head, and a re-tune. The car also features electronic ignition and K&N filters - all this is supported by an MOT valid until May 2026. It has an estimate of £3,500 to £4,000

For those considering a nicely presented MG Midget, Lot 37 is the one for you - a 1967 desirable square wheel arch Midget, finished in Black with a matching black soft top over black upholstery.

It comes with a strong history file, including invoices and MOT certificates dating back to 1996 and it has been regularly serviced in recent years by Phoenix Classic Cars. It will go to a new home for between £3,000 and £4,000.





One of the bargains of the day is looking like Lot 39, a 1979 MGB Roadster, finished in vibrant Flame Red with a contrasting black soft top over black leather interior with red piping which has lowly estimate of £2,500 to £3.500.

Originally a rubber bumper model, this Roadster has been converted to chrome, has been with the vendor for the past 11 years and has five former keepers recorded prior to this. It is offered with a wealth of invoices and MOT certificates

In 2014, the car underwent a full bare-metal refurbishment including conversion to wire wheels, replacement engine rubber mounts, radiator, water pump, starter motor, oil cooler hoses, alternator, fuel pump, HT leads & distributor cap, club exhaust and a new vinyl hood. Power comes from an Ivor Searle engine fitted approximately 27,000 miles ago.

You are going to have to pay more (£4,000 to £5,500 guide price) if you want an early 1967 MGBGT (Lot 56) finished in Tartan Red with a black leather interior which was restored around 30 years ago and benefited from further improvements in 2015. It has an MOT until March 2026.

The car comes with a leather-bound history file dating back to the 1980s, charting decades of maintenance and care. Included is a British Motor Industry Heritage Trust certificate confirming it was originally finished in Primrose Yellow.

An honest looking rubber bumper 1979 MGB Roadster in Old English White with a red roof and black side stripes appears at Lot 66 and is offered with an MOT valid until July 2026 and a guide price of £3,000 to £3,500.

In October 2024 it benefited from a series of mechanical and cosmetic improvements including the installation of an electronic ignition with new plugs and leads, fresh door cards, and a replacement soft-top hood. Braking and clutch systems were refreshed with two new front brake callipers, new rear brake shoes, cylinders, flexes, and both clutch and master cylinders. More recently it received a full set of four brand-new tyres.

Another early MGB (this time a 1965 example) is Lot 73, and this one is in red. No documented service history is available, so buyers should be prepared to carry out a full mechanical inspection and undertake maintenance as needed. This might make the £4,000 to £5,000 estimate a bit of a gamble.

A late entry at Lot 80 is a two-tone Steel Blue over Mineral Blue Varitone ZB Magnette (see left) dating from 1958 which is being offered with no reserve.

Owned by the vendor for the past six years, it is accompanied by a substantial history file that includes the original MG Magnette workshop manual, photos documenting restorative work, various invoices, MOT certificates and a wiring diagram.

This example has been upgraded with an MGB 1.8-litre engine (which will put off purists) mated to a 5-speed gearbox, disc brakes, electronic ignition, stainless-steel manifold and exhaust (invoice on file £2,461.80) and an electronic fan.

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
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
